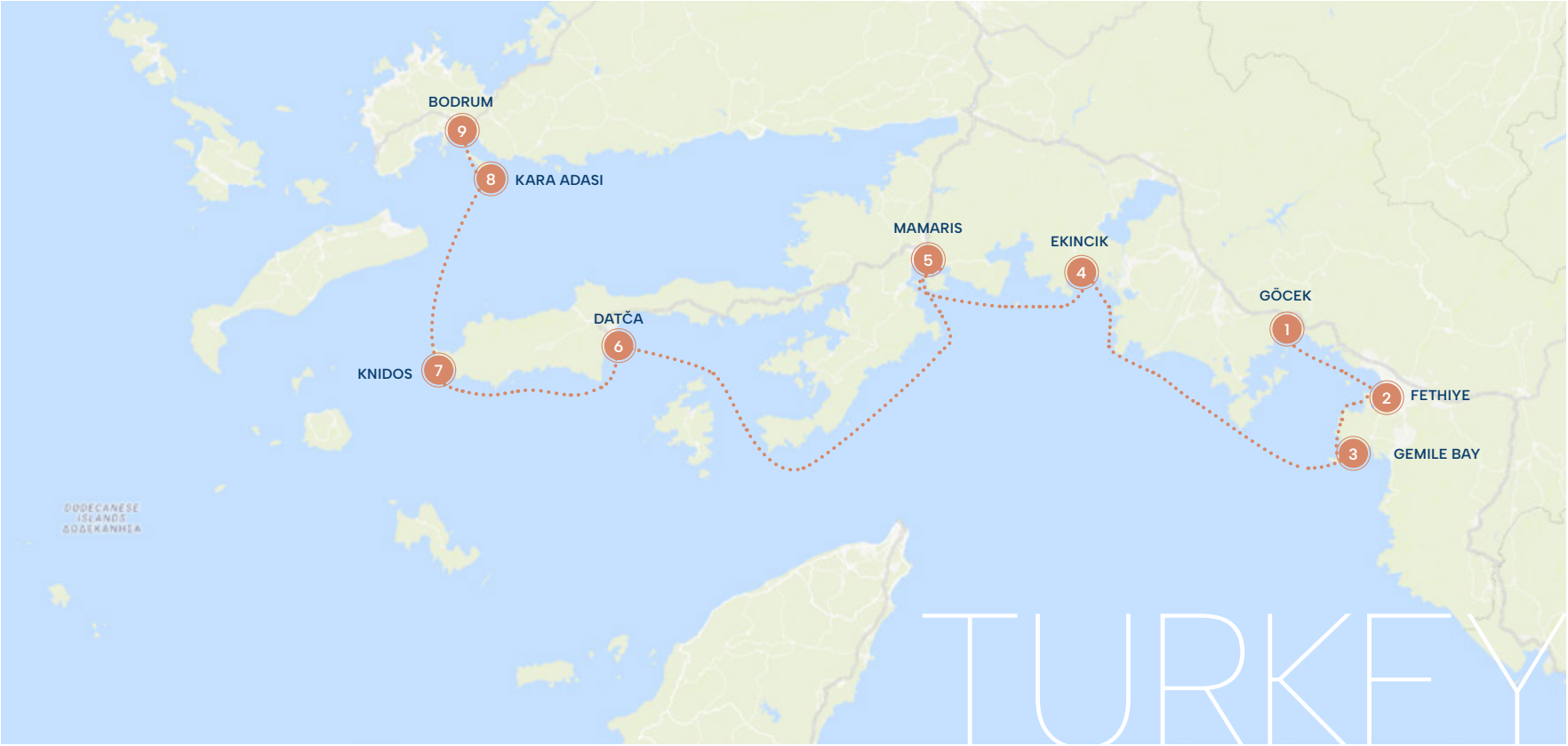

## DAY 1

### GÖCEK - FETHIYE

Distance: 11 nm  
Duration: 1 hour and 10 minutes  
Temperature: 31°

Fethiye is one of the most popular holiday destinations along the Turkish coast, frequented by luxury charter yachts throughout summer. Located in the Mugla province, this idyllic charter spot is renowned for its fantastic marina. Known as Telmessos in ancient times, it has an impressive fort, built by the Rhodes Knights, situated on a hill overlooking the Old Town. Fethiye is also known for its fascinating Lycian rock tombs, carved in to the cliffs and dating back as far as the 4th Century. But Fethiye isn't just about history though, the area is famous for its beautiful crystal clear waters, and white powder sands. There is a fantastic choice of beaches and watersports.

## DAY 2

### FETHIYE - GEMILE BAY

Distance: 14 nm  
Duration: 1 hour and 30 minutes  
Temperature: 32°

An exclusive hideaway, Gocke Gemile is something straight out of a fantasy novel with its landscaped gardens holding draped infinity pools and its epic views of the gauzy blue Mediterranean. A trio of private villas, a private funicular down to the secluded sandy cove, and the handcrafted vision of natural stone, wood, and glass is a celebration of organic pleasures on the Dalmatian coast. Charter guests can rest easy, dine like royalty, and tender to surrounding hidden bays for a full scope dream vision of this Turkish delight. Along with exploring, guests can enjoy fishing, kayaking, trekking, scuba diving, snorkelling, and horse riding.

## DAY 3

### GEMILE BAY - EKINCIK

Distance: 33 nm  
Duration: 3 hours and 30 minutes  
Temperature: 34°

Between Marmaris and Dalyan, lies Ekincik, a tranquil paradise is the ideal spot to soak in the fascinating surroundings without any distractions. The wild, pine covered bay of Kurkcüler has a lovely, long stretch of beach to enjoy an afternoon of sunrays. This is an ideal place to leave your boat and visit the fascinating ancient ruins of Kaunos which date back to 400 BC.

## DAY 4

### EKINCIK - MARMARIS

Distance: 19 nm  
Duration: 2 hours  
Temperature: 34°

Marmaris, like so many other places in Turkey, was once a lovely little fishing port, but in the past 20 years, it has grown in to a thriving resort town popular with luxury yachts and is now home to Turkey's largest marina. The busy promenade offers local restaurants and bars, with a lively atmosphere to relax in, on warm summer evenings, and the bustling bazaars in the old quarter of town are great for exploring. Being at the heart of the Turquoise Coast, Marmaris is of course popular for its numerous beautiful beaches, including the famous Icmeler beach which is ideal for watersports. Further along the coast you will be able to explore smaller bays and coves off which you can anchor and enjoy diving and snorkeling or basking on a deserted beach.

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# DAY 5

## MARMARIS - DATÇA

Distance: 46 nm  
Duration: 4 hours and 55 minutes  
Temperature: 30°

The Datça peninsula is a gem along Turkey’s coastline – scattered with the ruins of ancient empires, with emerald green hills that mirror the blue of the Aegean. This unspoilt stretch of coastline was, according to legend, created by Zeus, the God of the Sky and Light. With its vast number of natural bays, olive groves, and deserted beaches this unspoilt area is a treat for chartering. Another highlight of this stunning region, and well worth an excursion, are the ancient Greek ruins of Knidos. Once you have trekked the local ruins, Datca town itself is the place to enjoy fabulous seafood and meze dishes along with local wines.

# DAY 6

## DATÇA - KNIDOS

Distance: 21 nm  
Duration: 2 hours and 20 minutes  
Temperature: 27°

Providing an immersive experience of an ancient empire, Knidos is an intriguing escape where the Aegean and Mediterranean meet. With a sheltered port of striking cobalt blue, charter guests can admire the ancient architecture of an agora, theatre, odeum and several temples dedicated to the Greek gods. From all angles, these stoic stone structures gaze out across the ocean onto pine-tufted cliffs and the cloudless sky beyond. Situated off the western tip of the Datça Peninsula, the area is known for its olive, almond and fruit trees and for being home to a colony of the critically endangered Mediterranean monk seal. For awe-inspiring sunset views, guests can take a hike up to the Knidos Lighthouse, which casts a striking silhouette over the bay below.

# DAY 7

## KNIDOS - KARA ADASI

Distance: 18 nm  
Duration: 1 hour and 55 minutes  
Temperature: 30°

The largest island off Bodrum’s breathtaking coast, Kara Adasi, also referred to as Karaada or Black Island, is known for its healing mineral springs. A prime spot for admiring the turquoise shades of the endless Aegean, the island is only 6km from Bodrum and boasts many a sheltered, shimmering cove of white sand and soft slopes speckled with glorious greenery. On one side of the island, you’ll find waterfront restaurants with far reaching views across the ocean, caves, and limpid hot spring pools. Hot, arid summers balanced by wetter winters give the island it’s vibrant colour palette, while humidity during the warmer months is offset by the blissful breeze typical of the Bodrum area.

# DAY 8

## KARA ADASI - BODRUM

Distance: 5 nm  
Duration: 35 minutes  
Temperature: 30°

With its rich history and culture, Bodrum manages to blend old charm with modern essentials allowing you to enjoy the best of both worlds. Known as Halicarnassus of Caria in ancient times, it was home to one of the Seven Wonders of the Ancient World – The Tomb of Mausolus which was built around 350 BC. There are plenty of fascinating historical sites to explore, including the Ancient Roman Theatre which is still in use today, or stroll through Bodrum Castle with views over the two bays around which Bodrum lies, and is home to the fascinating Museum of Underwater Archaeology. Just behind the castle you will find Bodrum’s beautiful pedestrian alleyed Old Town, with its whitewashed stone houses, boutiques and cafés it is postcard perfect! When not exploring Bodrum’s ancient sites, the coastline is of course where you’ll want to be – the entire peninsula is lined with pristine, blue-flagged beaches.

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
